

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of April 1972, the NVA offensive assumed major proportions, with the fighting reaching a level of intensity unequalled since Tet 1968. In response to the massive enemy assault, the utilization of naval gunfire was increased substantially. The number of ship days provided by CTG 70.8 (Commander, Cruiser Destroyer Group, Seventh Fleet) rose to 295 with the number of rounds fired per ship day rising significantly from 92 in March to 129.5 in April, with 39,203 rounds of all types and calibers being fired in support of the Army of the Republic of Vietnam units and Vietnamese provincial forces. The augmentation of naval gunfire support assets included twenty-seven destroyers, the addition of two light cruisers, and the expected arrival, in May, of USS Newport News (CA-148) with her eight inch guns. Heavy counter battery fire was encountered in northern MR I, with several assets receiving direct hits from enemy artillery.

On 1 April 1972, after three days of intense bombardment by enemy rockets, mortars and artillery, outpost Alpha 2 was evacuated by helicopter. During the preceding days, naval gunfire had been directed by ANGLICO personnel from the outpost upon enemy troop staging areas, advancing enemy formations, likely avenues of approach, and in suppression of observed enemy firing positions. The presence of naval gunfire had delayed the inevitable fall of Alpha 2, but by 1 April 1972, the outpost was cut off, surrounded, and the ARVN battalion had withdrawn in general disorder. During the emergency evacuation, 1stLt D. C. BRUGGEMAN was mortally wounded and Cpl J. F. WORTH became missing in action.

From the Quang Tri Combat Base, naval gunfire was directed after the fall of Alpha 2, upon the advancing NVA units. Tanks, trucks, and massed enemy formations were taken under fire. The preponderance of naval gunfire supporturing the three days following the fall of Alpha 2 was unobserved due to continued rain, heavy cloud cover, and low visibility which served to mask the enemy assault.

On Easter Sunday, 2 April 1972, four ANGLICO air observers were located at Phu Bai Air Base, flying WNAF L-19 Birddog aircraft. Despite the continued bad weather, these observers were able to spot naval gunfire by ducking through breaks in the cloud cover, and by flying at extremely low and hazardous altitudes. During this same period, naval gunfire attacked tank formations by direct fire, engaged massed enemy personnel along the beach, and began to receive heavy, though sporadic, enemy counter battery fire.

Due in large part to naval gunfire support, the enemy advance was slowed, and ARVN units reformed and established a stable line of defense along the Cua Viet River. Naval gunfire assets, continually being augmented, hammered the area between the Cua Viet and Ben Hai rivers, destroying an estimated 15-20 enemy tanks, 300-400 enemy KIA, suppressing enemy coastal defense sites, and scattering observed enemy troop formations.

On 7 April 1972, with twelve hours notice, the ANGLICO operations in MR 4 were closed down, and its personnel transferred to MR 1. On 11 April 1972, at the specific request of the Commanding General, Delta Regional Assistance Command, ANGLICO personnel were re-established in MR 4. The 21st ARVN Division had departed the Delta area on 8 April 1972, in order to relieve beseiged An Loc, a provincial capitol west of Saigon, with 9th ARVN Division assuming control of the 21st ARVN Division's area of operations in addition to its own. The subsequent increase of enemy initiated activity prompted the request for ANGLICO's return.

On 8 April 1972, the Officer in Charge requested a personnel augmentation of twenty-one Marines, primarily aerial observers in order to provide continuous daylight air cover for three divisions. He further requested an additional eighteen Marines and two naval officers on 10 April 1972, when the requirement for reestablishment of NGF in MR 4 became known. Augmentation personnel, attached TAD, began arriving on 13 April 1972.

On 10 April 1972, the air observers at Phu Bai were transferred to DaNang and began flying with the 20th Tactical Air Support Squadron, U.S. Air Force The Seventh Air Force command, upon request from MACV, agreed to provide up to 42 OV-10 flight hours daily, weather allowing, providing continuous dawn to dusk air coverage for both the 1st and 3rd ARVN Division. On 27 April 1972, additional night missions commenced.

On 12 April 1972, in the pre-dawn darkness, an unobserved naval gunfire barrage of 300 rounds was fired fired from DaNang harbor into Elephant Valley. A morning aerial reconnaissance revealed an estimated 50-100 enemy KIA.

On 23 April 1972, upon COMUSMACV directive, naval gunfire was reestablished in MR 2. Headquartered at Qui Nhon, ANGLICO personnel were flying out of Phu Cat Air Base. Fighting was extremely heavy in the area, and many lucrative targets were taken under fire.



On 27 April 1972, a heavy daybreak bombardment by naval gunfire on a suspected regimental command post south of Hoai An, Binh Dinh Province, resulted in an estimated 50-100 enemy KIA.

On 29 April 1972, LZ English, in northern MR 2, was receiving heavy incoming fires. Nearby Hoai An had already been overrum. ANGLICO personnel along with U.S. Army advisors were preparing to evacuate.

On 30 April 1972, owing to increasing enemy pressure from both heavy artillery barrages and probing enemy ground assaults, resulting in the fall of Dong Ha on the Cua Viet River, the loss of Quang Tri appeared imminent.

By 30 April 1972, the tactical situation in both MR 1 and 2, was extremely fluid and uncertain. Although ARVN units continued to withdraw, the enemy gains have been less rapid than initially feared. ANGLICO operations are expected to remain at a high level in the foreseeable future.
