PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of August 1972 ground offensives by the South Vietnamese Armed Forces supported by massive US air and naval gunfire support continued, but stiffened enemy defenses prevented gains comparable to those obtained the previous month. CTG 70.8 (Commander, Cruiser Destroyer Group, Seventh Fleet) provided 495 ship-days. The number of rounds fired per ship-day decreased slightly from 145 in July to 136 with 67.546 rounds of all types and calibers being fired in support of the Army of the Republic of Vietnam, the Vietnamese Marine Corps, and Vietnamese Provincial Forces. Significant among developing enemy tactics was the mining of the waters at the mouth of the Cua Viet River. Three United States Destroyers experienced explosions close aboard, but sustained no personnel or material damage.

The first three days of August witnessed the expending of nearly 9000 rounds of naval gunfire in and around Quang Tri City in preparation for an assault on the citadel by the 268th Vietnamese Marine Corps Brigade. By the end of the 3rd of August the Vietnamese Marines had three companies on three sides of the citadel and were readying reconaissance teams to enter the citadel. The enemy responded with withering artillery, mortar and small arms fire. The Vietnamese Marines were forced to regroup. The remainder of the month was spent in efforts to eliminate the enemy supporting arms that had been the decisive factor in preventing the capture of the citadel. Naval gunfire missions were concentrated to the north and northwest of Quang Tri City, hampering the flow of supplies and personnel into the citadel.

The Danang and Hue areas have been subjected to sporadic enemy attacks, but these have been infrequent and short-lived, not connected to any large scale enemy action. Naval gunfire activity in these areas was limited to several firings on several intelligence targets.

Enemy activity in Quang Ngai Province, the southern most province in Military Region I, was sporadic and widely dispersed for the first half of the month. Naval gunfire missions consisted mostly of harrassment and interdiction missions and firings on intelligence targets in Mo Duc and Duc Pho Districts. On 18 August 1972 the NVA mounted a sizeable assault on IZ Ross and Que Son northwest of Chu Lai. By the next day the ARVN defenders were routed and IZ Baldy was threatened. IZ Ross and Que Son are outside naval gunfire range. Enemy initiated incidents decreased for the remainder of the month as the NVA planned further operations.

Operation 22-18 which began 19 July 72 with the objective of liberating the three northern most districts of Binh Dinh Province, Military Region II through this month. During the first week of August the 22nd ARVN Division concentrated its efforts in the area of the Bong Song River, west of QL-1. On 3 August 1972 a fire mission fired by the USS PROVIDENCE (CLG-6) and adjusted by an ANGLICO spotter netted the following GDA: 33 structures damaged, 3 bunkers destroyed, 4 bunkers damaged, 3 secondary explosions, 5 sustained fires, 3 mortar positions silenced, and 1 direct hit on a mortar position. By the second week of August light enemy resistance resulted in the adjustment of naval gunfire ships supporting this operation from four to two. Naval gunfire supported operations for the remainder of the month were divided between the Lao Valley and 506 Valley in the vicinity of Hoi An. Significant enemy resistance was met in the latter and it is anticipated that it will take several more weeks for mopping-up operations to be completed.

On 10 August 72 the 21st ARVN Division, just returned from the fight at An Loc, took over the 9th ARVN Division's TAOR and established its CP at Vi Thanh, Chuong Thien Province, Military Region IV. Ground operations by the 21st ARVN Division will be concentrated in Chuong Thien Province, outside naval gunfire range, for the forseeable future, as it is this province that has experienced the highest level of enemy activity in recent months. With the departure of 9th ARVN Division from Rach Gia the Naval Gunfire Liaison/Spot Team there established new liaison with the Kien Giang Province Edvisory Team and will continue to function in the same capacity as before. Throughout the month of August enemy initiated incidents remained at a moderate level with outlying CP's receiving occasional mortar attacks. The U Minh Forest along the west coast of the delta remains a large NVA logistics base for supplies smuggled down the coast in water borne logistics craft from Cambodia, as there have been no significant intrusions by ARVN forces. Significant GDA reported by aerial observors spotting naval gunfire missions in this area continue to support this fact.

The month of August saw the anticipated stiffened NVA defense posture slow allied drives in Military Regions I and II. The 21st ARVN Division, with its reputation as a truly aggressive unit, returned to the delta. A greater number of allied initiated incidents are anticipated in this area. For the entire month the unit experienced only one minor injury due to hostile causes. The degree of enemy resistance making itself felt throughout South Vietnam is expected to continue for the forseeable future.
