With its deep ruby colour, red berry aroma and wonderful smooth finish, Shakespeare may well have been inspired to utter 'parting is such sweet sorrow'.

Cropton Britannia Ale

and light oitrus aftertaste - has been brewed exclusively for us by Cropton Brewery. These days, you have the right to remain refreshed.

Lancaster Blonde

Come in from the cold, choose a seat by the fire and ask for a pint of Lancaster Blonde. If you're looking for a pale beer that's full of real taste, you've come to the right place. Lovingly crafted by the Lancaster brewers using a winning combination of Maris Otter and Munich malts, this blonde always starts with a hint of bitterness and ends with a long, dry finish. A perfect finish to any chilly winter's day.

Cropton Dangleberry

Perched on the edge of the North Yorkshire Moors National Park, Cropton Brewery has been producing outstanding real ales since 1984. With its fruity nose and strong hoppy flavours, Dangleberry is no exception. Created for the Cropton Winter beer festival and NGLEBERRY named after one of the bands performing there (The Dangleberries 99 - a Cropton favourite), the sound of pouring Dangleberry has always been music to the ears.

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Hydes Berry Good Ale

Berry Good. One sip, we think you'll agree the name says it all. Of course, the first thing you'll notice is its deep ruby red colour, all thanks to the inspired addition of natural berry juice. Next, there's the taste - and it's this wonderful beer's fine, flavoursome balance of fruit and hops that makes it so highly quaffable. Berry berry nice indeed.



Springhead Polar Beer



Great things come from small beginnings. Such is the case with the brewers of this refreshing pele beer. Founded in 1990, Springhead was once the smallest micro brewery in Britain (So small in fact, it earned a place in the Guinness book of records). As it's grown over the years, so

has its reputation for producing some of the finest beers around. With its subtle hints of lemon and crisp finish, Polar Beer is yet another fine example. Try it, maybe you could set your own record - person with the biggest smile.

Nethergate Azzaparrot



Traditional ales don't come much more traditional than this. A re-creation of an original amber coloured beer dating way back to 1823, Nethergate's Azzaparrot packs a powerfully floral, spicy punch. Now a moder classic, this beer with its fine red hue and strong rich taste barks back to a time less burried. So what ABV 4.2% better reason to take your time over a pint or two?

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Ringwood Fortyniner

The golden shades of autumn may have faded, but gold is the colour of this full bodied beer with a fresh hop bouquet. Combining its moderate bitterness with a sweet malt aroma, it's rich in taste too. But you can't mention Ringwood without mentioning another colour. Fortyniner won a silver medal at the Burtonon-Trent International Beer Competition back in 19%. It's been winning the hearts of beer lovers all over the country ever since.

A light chestnut ale with a fruity aroma, Rudolph's delightfully refreshing taste is sure to make it a festive favourite. After a spell of Christmas shopping, surely you deserve a little reward too?

Once upon a time there was a beer called Dark Mild. Ruby red in colour, it was loved by people from all over the land. Until the day came when, inspired by the delicate nutty flavour, the brewers themselves decided such a wonderful beer deserved a much more memorable name. And so it was that Dark Mild became Nutty Black. But that's just the start of the fairytale.

Nutty Black went on to become one of only four beers to have won CAMRA's Champion Beer of Britain award more than once. As you'd expect, that's something Daniel Thwaites of Lancashire are proud to let people know. In fact, they've added CAMRA's exclusive Beer of Britain winner's logo to the clip you'll see in all our pubs serving Nutty Black on tap.
